


The 2023/24 was the final season for the club. Members wishing to camp there in the future will need to apply directly to the WhiteCliffs to Camerons Bight Camp Ground.

BAIRNSDALE

Saturday morning was free for us to explore Bairnsdale, we all headed down to the main shopping strip where we had coffee. After lunch we gather for a game of clomp which was very







The market had a great variety of stalls including food, vegetables, plants, craft and general items. We sat in the shade having coffee and a feed of donuts before heading back to camp. After lunch we headed off to Painesville and Raymond Island. We took the ferry across the channel to Raymond Island where we went for a walk around the streets to look at the Koala's, of which there were many sitting effortlessly high in the gum trees. Taking the ferry back to Painesville it was time for an ice-cream which was delicious. After a short walk along the foreshore looking at the boats, we headed off to the Mitchell River Silt Jetties near Eagle Point.

The Silt Jetties are an unusually long, thin landform in the Gippsland Lakes. A type of delta, they have been formed over thousands of years by sediment deposition from the Mitchell River during periods of low water flow and subsequent wash-through during periods of high water flow. We drove the long narrow banks of silt more than eight kilometres east into Lake King to the end. At the car park we walked about 30 meters to the end which had fantastic view over the water. We then headed back to camp and happy hour at picknick tables overlooking the Mitchell River, this was a relaxing time having a chat after a big day exploring.

Monday morning we said our farewells, all in all a great weekend.







Saturday morning started with a quick meeting and coffee at the bbq area, followed by free time. At 11:30 we headed off the Mansfield Zoo where we had a picknick lunch in the zoo's bbq area before wandering around the zoo.
