We are still hunting for a suitable property for our club. Seems the ones that are suitable and affordable get sold quicker than we were able to act. Hopefully we can find something soon.




We need a new President and Secretary if our club is to continue.

FLINDERS RANGES

March

The March Tag Along Rally to the Flinders Ranges started at Kerang after having a great weekend at the state rally. We had 5 caravans on the rally which was a good number making it easy to get to know one another and booking into parks a bit easier. We were fortunate that the weather during our trip was pleasant which made for a good time traveling and sightseeing.



Day 1: Kerang to Cullulleraine Monday 18 March – 360kl

We woke to a sunny day and left Kerang about 10am after having a farewell coffee with others that attended the state rally. Our day was basically a travel day with us wanting to get some kilometres up with our destination being Cullulleraine. Our first stop along the way was Sea Lake where we had lunch, most of us went for a walk down the main street and lunch in the park. After lunch we continued our journey stopping at Lake Tyrell, a pink lake due to the salt content. We spent some time here exploring where the old salt works use to be and taking photos of the scenery. Leaving Sea Lake we headed toward Red Clifts along the Calder Hwy and then onto our overnight stop at Tranguill Water Cullulleraine. Along the way, unfortunately the window on Mary and Moniurs motorhome door fell out, Roger following stopped and collected the broken pieces which was useful later in making temporary repairs, thank goodness for duct tape. The caravan park on the lake was a great spot to stop for the night, we arrived about 4:30pm, with large sites there was no need to unhook, so set up was quick. Happy hour was on the lake foreshore where we sat. chatted and watched the sunset over the lake After watching a lovely sunset, we headed back to our vans for dinner and a rest after a long day.

Day 2: Cullulleraine to Peterborough Tuesday 19 March – 370kl

We left Cullulleraine today for our overnight destination Peterborough. It was another big day travelling, passing through Renmark we stopped for supplies and fuel. At Barmara we took the Goyder Hwy toward Burra where we had lunch. We arrived at Peterborough about 3:30pm and stayed at the caravan park. The park had drive through sites making easy setup which was welcomed by all. We had happy hour in the camp kitchen, it was another enjoyable time getting to know one another over drinks and nibbles.

Day 3: Peterborough to Flinders Ranges Wednesday 20 March – 180kl

After 2 big days it was a short trip today to the Flinders Ranges and our accommodation at Rawnsley Park Station. Along the way we stopped at Cradock for morning tea, the town was surveyed in 1879 and predominately served the farming community at the time. We continued onto Hawker, replenished our vehicles with fuel and arrived at Rawnsley Park early afternoon after a short stop for a photo opportunity. It was a relaxing afternoon before we all met for happy hour in the camp kitchen. We had a great time chatting then headed back to our vans for dinner, some of us watched the sunset over the Flinders.









Day 4: Flinders Ranges Thursday 21 March

Today we went on a day trip to Blinman, sightseeing at various places along the way. We left at 9am and our first stop was Hucks Lookout then Stokes Hill Lookout with its magnificent 360 degree views of the Flinders Ranges and panoramic views of Wilpena Pound, it was a great spot for taking photos. We continued to Wills Homestead where we had morning tea. Built around 1851 and occupied until 1870 it stands testament to struggles of early pastoral endeavours. The abandoned homestead and dry-stone walls were amazing to see, walking around the site we also explored the various outhouses and yards.

Our next stop was our destination, Blinman where we had lunch. This rural and remote town is the highest town in South Australia, it obtained its name from when Copper was discovered by a shepherd named Robert Blinman in 1859. After exploring the town we headed to the 'Great Wall of China', driving off the main road we took the track to the lookout which provided great views of the rock face across the top of the mountains. The last part of the journey home took us off the beaten track. Turning off the main road we took the Brachina and Bunyeroo Gorge roads, we visited the Heysen Range and ABC Range, Brachina Gorge and Aroona Valley along the way. The scenery and views were amazing and it was interesting in the gorges to see how high and forceful recent floods had been, moving large branches and gathering of debris in front of trees.

Looping back to the main road we headed back to camp for happy hour and a rest.

Day 5: Flinders Ranges Friday 22 March

A day trip was planned today with our destination being the Ochre Pits at Lyndhurst. Our trip took us back to Hawker where we topped up fuel, then up the 'Outback Highway' to Leigh Creek and Lyndhurst. Our first stop was the mining town of Leigh Creek, we stopped at the shopping centre and had morning tea before heading to the Ochre Pits, about 5kl north of Lyndhurst. The Ochre pits are spectacular and have been used by Aboriginal people for thousands of years. They traded the ochre with other tribes over vast distances and in every direction of the continent. Ochre was an extremely valuable and spiritual item and played an important role in Aboriginal culture. After spending a good hour here we headed back to Leigh Creek for lunch and a break. After lunch we went to the Aroona Dam that supplies water to Leigh Creek and the mine. The dam had a nice picknick area set in the hills, well worth the visit. Our plan today was the have dinner at the Hawker Hotel before heading back to camp, on the way home we stopped at the Parachilna Hotel for happy hour before heading to Hawker. Our meals were delicious, particularly the pizza's and we relaxed after a great day. It had turned dark when it was time to head back to Rawnsley Park, in hindsight a mistake as the roos came out making a very slow trip home.











Day 6: Flinders Ranges Saturday 23 March

Today we sadly farewelled Bill & Don and Mounir & Mary who commenced their own adventures heading home. The rest of us had booked an additional nights accommodation so we could explore more of the area. Leaving camp our first stop was the 'Cazneaux Tree'. The tree was made famous by photographer Harold Cazneaux who photographed the tree in 1937, he called it "The Spirit of Endurance". We then headed to Wilpena Pound and walked from the information centre along Wilpena Creek to the old Hills homestead and back. A pleasant walk and lots to see along the way. On returning to the information centre, we had lunch on the veranda and chatted over a coffee, this was relaxing after the walk. After lunch we headed back to Hawker and visited the Jeff Morgan Gallery, the gallery has large wall sized paintings and a 360 degree panorama of the Flinders Ranges. In addition to paintings the gallery has a collection of cars, rocks and other memorabilia. We headed back to Rawnsley Park and had happy hour at the lookout. Sitting in our chairs taking in the beautiful sunset over the ranges was a fantastic end to our time at the Flinders Rangers.

Day 7: Flinders Ranges to Burra Sunday 24 March

Today we left for Burra and stayed at the Bon Accord Hotel. The hotel has 2 ensuites for use and both powered and unpowered sites available a great place to stay. On arrival we quickly set up and had coffee in the rotunda. We decided to have happy hour and dinner at the hotel which was very enjoyable.

Day 8: Burra Monday 25 March

Today was set aside to explore Burra. Our first stop was the Burra and Goyder Visitor Information Centre and purchased the Burra Heritage Passport & Passport Key. With the Passport Key in hand, we gained entry into the Bon Accord Museum, Redruth Gaol, Unicorn Brewery Cellars, and the Miners Dugouts. Burra is a popular area for movie production with parts of Breaker Morant filmed at the Goal and The Water Diviner at the Cellars.

Day 9: Depart Burra Tuesday 26 March

Today concluded the rally with us all heading home in different directions. The rally was a great success, the weather great, plenty to see and do and everyone in the group got on fantastic and had a great time. See you at the next Tag Along.
