

TAGALONG RALLY REPORT

EDEN, COOMA AND TUMUT

Our March tagalong rally commenced at Lakes Entrance after the ACCVic State rally which concluded on Monday morning after morning tea in the camp kitchen. ACCVic President thanked the committee and those who attended and wished safe travel's home.

Day 1 Monday - Lakes Entrance to Mallacoota.

Instead of going home seven caravans headed off for Mallacoota that is surrounded by the magnificent wilderness of the Croajingolong National Park and set on the picturesque Mallacoota Inlet, Mallacoota was about 200 kilometres from Lakes Entrance, about a 2 1/2 hour drive so it wasn't a big day of travelling in the car. We were all surprised by how green and lush the country side was along the way when compared to the rest of the state. We stopped at Cann River for a short break before reaching Mallacoota about 1:00pm. Our accommodation was at the Mallacoota Foreshore Holiday Park, a large park overlooking the sea and lakes. After booking in we quickly set up and relaxed for the afternoon, being a nice sunny day some went for walks along the foreshore or into town to do some shopping. We all gathered at 4:30 for happy hour and enjoyed a chat over drinks and nibbles before retiring for the day.

Day 2 Tuesday - Mallacoota

It was a sunny day and the morning activities was a trip to a World War 2 bunker and a drive to Pebbly Beach. It was a short drive out of Mallacoota to the original WWII Operations













Bunker that was built in 1942 as an Advanced Operations Base. It was a high security Installation and formed part of a chain of defence bases around the Australian Coastline. It was used by the RAAF during WWII for Communications and housed wireless equipment and trained operators who were listening to coastal shipping and gathering intelligence to protect coastal shipping and keep the sea lanes open. Inside the bunker where was an excellent video about the bunkers history and Mallacoota's contribution to the war effort. The display of equipment and photo's from the time was interesting, well worth the visit.

After leaving the bunker we headed for Pebbly Beach which was not too far away. Driving for a few kilometres down a well-made dirt road we arrived at a small car parking area where we left the cars for a short walk to the beach. The beach was sandy with great sea views and interesting rock formations. After exploring and taking many pictures, we headed back to camp for lunch and a relaxing afternoon. For happy hour we headed to a lookout point which was a short walk from our camp site. We finish off our day overlooking Mallacoota Inlet and the ocean, it was enjoyable time and a great spot to chat and sit back taking in the sunny afternoon over drinks and snacks.

Day 3 Wednesday - Mallacoota

Today was left free to relax or as Alan did, play some golf. It was another fine day and for afternoon tea we all went on a boat trip on the Mallacoota Lakes. Departing from the wharf we boarded the Loch-Ard for a 2 hour cruise. Dale, the skipper of the Lock-Ard provide excellent commentary about the boat and its history and different feature around the lake system. At our furthest point we stopped for afternoon tea and Dale was also able to attract the local Sea Eagles by tempting them with chicken wings. These majestic birds with their excellent eyesight swooped down close to the boat providing excellent photo opportunities. The trip concluded

at 6pm, being our last night at Mallacoota and to also farewell 2 of the group heading back to Melbourne, we decided to go the hotel for dinner. There was plenty of meals to choose from the menu, and they arrived quickly after having order. We all enjoyed the time before heading back to camp and retiring for the evening.

Day 4 Thursday – Mallacoota to Eden

We farewelled Greg and Marylyn, and Alan and Meryl this morning as they headed back to Melbourne, leaving 5 caravans to continue the journey. Our destination today was Eden, a short trip of 79klm, therefore, there was no hurry to get away early. We departed Mallacoota at 10am and arrived at Eden about 11am. Today was left free to explore the town, David had to undertake some repairs to the water pump having developed a leak and was quickly fixed. A large cruise ship was in port which was interesting to see as it dwarfed the dock area. After happy hour we went to a lookout point to see the ship depart and head out to sea.

Day 5 Friday - Eden

We woke to rain which didn't stop until 2pm. The trip we planned to Green Cape Lighthouse was cancelled, and we decided to go to the Killer Whale Museum as an alternative. The museum had a large number for artifacts based on the shore-based whaling industry and told the interesting story of the unique working relationship between the whalers and killer whales of Twofold Bay. As whales headed south the killer whales would herd and hold other whale species into Twofold Bay and alert whalers of there presents. The whalers, in return would reward the killer whales with parts of the harvested whales. The skeleton of "Old Tom", the most famous of the killer whales is on display as the centre piece of the exhibits.











After the museum the day was left free to explore or relax. Happy hour was a good time to catch up and chat about the days activities. The caravan park had a food van in the evening and a few of us indulged in burgers or hot dogs which were delicious.

Day 6 Saturday - Eden

Today, with the weather having improved, our group headed off to Green Cape Lighthouse located in the Ben Boyd National Park. After a 45 minute drive from Eden, we arrived at the car park and then made the short walk to the Lighthouse and lookout with its spectacular views over the Tasman Sea

Green Cape Lighthouse is the southernmost lighthouse in NSW and made the record books when it was built in 1883 as Australia's first concrete lighthouse tower. Standing at 29m high, the whitewashed tower overlooks a rugged stretch of the Sapphire Coast.

Despite the presence of the lighthouse a major shipwreck occurred in May 1886. The SS Ly-eemoon en route to Sydney from Melbourne, struck a reef close to the Green Cape at night. 71 people were lost with the lighthouse keepers only being able to save 15 people.

After Green Cape, we headed off to Boyds Tower which was built in 1847 and stands 23 metres high, it was constructed from Pyrmont sandstone brought by steamer from Sydney. It was originally built as a lighthouse, but the government considered it unsuitable and therefore was never used as a lighthouse, although it did serve as a whale-spotting site. The structure is in good condition for is age and well worth the visit.

Leaving Boyds Tower we headed back towards Eden and stopped at Boydtown and Seahouse Inn for lunch, just making it in time before the kitchen closed. Being a nice day, we sat outside in the garden area and enjoyed our meals overlooking Twofold Bay.

The Seahorse Inn was originally built for Ben Boyd in 1843 using convict labour. Boyd had arrived in Sydney in 1842, set up a bank, bought a paddle-steamer named Seahorse and decided that Twofold Bay would be ideal as the harbour for his operations. However, the cost of establishing Boydtown began to affect him financially and in 1849 the liquidators were called in. The Seahorse Inn was abandoned that year and the incomplete hotel lay vacant for nearly a century. Inevitably it suffered the ravages of decay and vandalism. It wasn't until 1936 that the Whiter family renovated the ruin, added an extra storey and created the modern building it is today.

Day 7 Sunday - Eden to Cooma

It was time to move on to our next destination. Cooma. We left Eden about 10am taking the Princess Highway to Kingswood then turning off onto the Snowy Mountains Highway towards Cooma. It was a sunny morning but as we approached the Great Divide, thick fog set in making the windy climb through the mountains somewhat slower than anticipated. On reaching the other side safely, it was like opening a door, the fog was gone, and a sunny day was once again back. It was approaching lunch time and after going through the hills, a break was needed so we stopped at the small town of Nimmitabel. which had a good traveller's rest area with ample parking for us all. It was a short walk to the bakery up the street for food and drinks before heading onto Cooma. At Cooma we booked in and relaxed for the remained of the afternoon. We had our traditional happy hour before heading off to Mount Gladstone Lookout to take in the sunset and its spectacular views of the Monaro Plains. The sunset was a great way to finish the day.













Day 8 Monday - Cooma

Our morning was taken up with a visit to Snowy Hydro Discovery Centre in Cooma. The centre provided an excellent history of the Snowy Scheme with displays of artifacts, pictures and dioramas. Over the course of construction. more than 100,000 people from more than 30 countries worked on the Scheme. The Scheme drove a wave of engineering innovation. It introduced the development of 'rockbolting' - a safer and cheaper alternative to concrete lining for supporting rock in tunnel walls. In 1960, 'Snocom' was Australia's first transistorised computer and one of the first dozen or so computers in the world. It helped ensure the Scheme was completed on-time and within budget, by completing engineering and design calculations. Safety practices on the Scheme were well ahead of comparable projects around the world at that time. The Authority made wearing of seatbelts compulsory in all vehicles in 1960, a decade before the rest of the country.

After lunch we went for a drive to explore the town of Jindabyne. Our first stop was the Snowy Region Visitor Centre run by the NSW Parks Service. The centre provide a short video on the Kosciusko National Park, its Aboriginal heritage and wildlife. And a small gallery with local art exhibits. The was also a display of corroboree frogs that were difficult to find due their impressive camouflage. We left the centre and went for a drive around part of the lake and stopped to take some pictures.

Dinner tonight was at the Cooma Ex Services Club where we celebrated Terry's birthday. It was an enjoyable evening relaxing after a big day exploring the area. Hope you had a great day Terry.

Day 9 Tuesday – Cooma to Angler's Reach

Today we continued along the Snowy Mountain Highway to Angler's Reach for our overnight stay. It was another short trip being about an hour from Cooma. After lunch we headed to Adaminaby to visit the Snowy Scheme Museum only to find it closed, fortunately there was still a bit of equipment outside that was used on the Snowy Scheme that we could look at. Across the road from the museum was the Big Trout, a must photo opportunity. We explored the town and after coffee we headed off to Lake Eucumbene and Old Adaminaby to explore, stopping at the picnic area and boat ramp to view the lake.

Day 10 Wednesday – Angler's Reach to Tumut

Leaving Angler's Reach about 9:30, we headed back to the highway for our journey to Tumut about 3 hours away. Parts of our trip was very steep and in one spot we descended over 1000 meters over 7 kilometres. Along the way we stopped at the Kiandra Heritage Precinct for morning tea, the precinct was originally a courthouse during the gold era but now serves as a great rest stop, with fantastic views. We arrived at our caravan park late morning and had the afternoon free to explore the Tumut township. Some of us went to the famous Tumut Broom Factory where you could see a variety of different brooms being made, you also had the opportunity to purchase one if you wanted. The evening provided us with a spectacular rainbow display approaching sunset which was interesting to see.











Day 11 Thursday – Tumut

Today's adventures was a trip to Talbingo, Tumit3 power station about 40 minutes out of Tumut and Adelong Falls Gold Mining Ruins. Travelling back along the Snowy Mountain Highway we passed Blowering Dam and Talbingo to arrive at Tumut 3 Power Station Construction commenced in 1968. with its completion in 1974. Tumut 3 is the largest power station in the Snowy Scheme and its pipes had to be made onsite as they were too large to bring in by truck. To allow for water pressure the pipes steel is 19mm thick at the top and increase to 30mm at the power station. Each pipe is 488m long and 5.6m in diameter. Amazing to see. From the power station we travelled to Talbingo Dam, water storage for Tumut 3. We stopped for pictures on the dam wall before arriving at the boat ramp and picnic area for a walk and look around. We headed back to Talbingo for a quick look around, the town was a construction camp during construction of Tumut 3 and now a holiday destination for those that like fishing. Heading back to Tumut we stopped at Blowering Dam, as the dam was low, we were able to drive down onto the dam and waters edge that provided great views of the dam wall. We then went to Adelong Falls Gold Mining Ruins. Gold mining in Adelong Creek took place around the 1870's, the Reefer Battery ore crushing mill on the creek could be easily seen from the viewing area. The site has a great undercover picnic area where we had lunch before heading back to camp for a rest then happy hour. This being our last day of the tag along trip we decided to have a pizza dinner, the guys headed off to the pizza shop and arrived back at the park with the feast. It was a great wat to end our trip, great company, a warm evening and fantastic food.

Day 12 Friday - Home

We all headed off today for home or a slower pace with stops along the way.

All in all another fantastic trip taking in some spectacular and interesting parts of our country.


